



SCHOTTENSTIFT

Welcome to Schottenstift Abbey, the monastery in the heart of Vienna!

The Benedictine Abbey of Our Lady of the Scots was founded by the Babenberg Duke Henry II, called Jasomirgott, in 1155.

The fields in which we work are wide-ranging: pastoral care and activities for people who are spiritually connected to us; education, including the Schottengymnasium grammar school and other forms of work with young people; and, finally, management of the business activities carried out as part of our task to preserve and administer the estate which was endowed to us when the monastery was founded in the 12th century.

Schottenstift Abbey is primarily a community of people engaging in prayer, who try to put into practice the Gospel and the precepts of St. Benedict, to seek God and to provide a place for people who are looking for a centre for their own spiritual life.

Hospitality is one of the principles of every Benedictine community, and our house too is open to guests from all over the world. Whether you have a cultural interest in our monastery, want to participate in one of the church services, or wish to stay at our guest house (Benediktushaus), you can find all the information you need here, as well as the contact details of persons who will be able to help you further:

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Schottenstift Abbey Museum

The museum is accommodated in the rooms of what used to be the abbot's apartments and is entered via the monastery shop (Freyung 6). Its collections are of particular interest, since Schottenstift Abbey was one of the few monasteries never to be dissolved. The most beautiful pieces – which include paintings, liturgical implements, precious liturgical garments, valuable antique furniture, books, manuscripts and documents – are exhibited in the museum. The most precious treasures are the panels of the so-called Schotten Altar, which is a major work of Gothic panel painting. Two of the panels show how Vienna looked in 1470; they are the oldest existing topographical representations of the city.

Guided tours of the abbey are conducted every Saturday (at 2.30 p.m.). As part of the guided tour you can see not only the museum but also the Schottenkirche church (including the crypt and the Romanesque Chapel), as well as the Prelates' Hall and the Abbey Library.
